

MESSAGE FROM MAYOR VERTREESE

"America will never be destroyed from the outside. If we lose our freedoms, it will be because we have destroyed ourselves from within." ~Abraham Lincoln

The acts of insurrection within our Capitol building demonstrates the degree to which we have allowed corruption, greed, tyranny and misinformation to destroy faith in our principles, threaten or destroy lives, and supersede the needs of the people. At a loss of approximately 500,000 lives, the Civil War was the reckoning that set us on the trajectory towards a "more perfect" union. Gaps in education, economy and opportunity has led us to back to a place of reckoning. The pandemic highlighted a myriad of systematic flaws and added stress to the already stressed; however, All Politics is Local. We must stop repeating the same and expect different results.



Democracy fails when deals are made in the shadows by seedy influencers who grift off of any successes and hold zero accountability for abject failures of this town. As Mayor, it is my responsibility to appoint vendors who are qualified and meet open and fair bidding requirements pursuant to State law. As it is my Administration that is held accountable for the performance and/or non-performance of professionals, the Council's role is only to advise and consent in order to allow the functioning of the town to proceed. For the last 30+ years, the Council's vehement refusal to embrace their role has come at a hefty cost to tax payers by way of frivolous lawsuits, targeting employees who then implement lawsuits and refusing to pass any budget(s) on time, which for year 2020 came at a \$600k loss in tax assessment revenue.

Over the past few months, Council members were invited to meet and discuss ways to provide better governance to the township; only Councilwoman Mondella and Councilman Epps agreed to meet. Sadly, the first Council meeting of the year only demonstrated its intent to destroy the administration and ignore the mountain of problems we must climb for the duration of 2021. The Council's decision to forego passing a fully funded temporary budget forced terminations of my staff and the recreation department, both of which have helped me steer communal response and activities. Such actions have prevented the Administration from appointing vendors to start and/or continue necessary infrastructure and development projects. Residents are directly impacted by such decisions when we face sewer backups that due to our deteriorating 100-year-old pumping station(s), experience underground water seeping into our homes and when 30-year-old first response vehicles have broken down when we have needed them most.

Our lack of resources, economic development and sparse financial state precedes my administration, but in all the reasons I ran for Mayor, I forge forward with a belief that good government is possible. I am a believer that facts matter and that Hillside has better days ahead, but only if we are ready to make better decisions for a better tomorrow. My focus remains on doing my job. I am committed to supporting township employees who put the Township First and applaud the hard work performed with minimal staffing and sparse funding. We will continue to have our weekly food distribution, address immediate supports to residents and maintain our diligence regarding response. In my continued effort for outreach and accessibility, please look forward to Virtual Monthly Meetings with Department leaders.

For January 2021, residents will have direct access to Hillside Police Chief Vincent Ricciardi on Wednesday, January 13, 2021, starting at 7:00 p.m. The Chief and other superior officers will engage in a conversation regarding internal improvements, communal opportunities and other services available. The only way for the township to move forward is for the people to be engaged, properly informed, guided by facts and have reasonable access to those responsible for meeting our needs. Business to Business, Person to Person, Block by Block, let's commit to building our community for our future together.

FIREFIGHTER CANDIDATES

Last week Mayor Vertreese and Acting Fire Chief Doug Ferrigno welcomed 30-potential future Firefighters at Town Hall. This is the first time the Township will be adding firefighters since 2013. The Mayor gave an introductory speech before turning the program over to Hillside staff, who provided the candidates an overview of what they could expect the next few weeks. Police Captain Lashonda Burgess explained how the process includes a thorough background check, finger-print analysis and residency check. All Hillside firefighters must live in the Township. “We will knock on doors,” Burgess said. “There’s no providing an address that belongs to your grandmother, aunt, or cousin. You must be able to prove you live in Hillside.” Mayor Vertreese emphasized she was proud to see three female candidates and was excited about the diversity of the pool of applicants. “I’m excited you all are interested in supporting and working for our residents,” Vertreese said. “Our firefighters put their lives on the line every day. Our firefighters are the ones who go into homes and transport residents to the hospital. You will be taking people who may have COVID to the hospital. You will be a first-responder and I can’t tell you how much I appreciate our firefighters and everyone who works for the Township.”

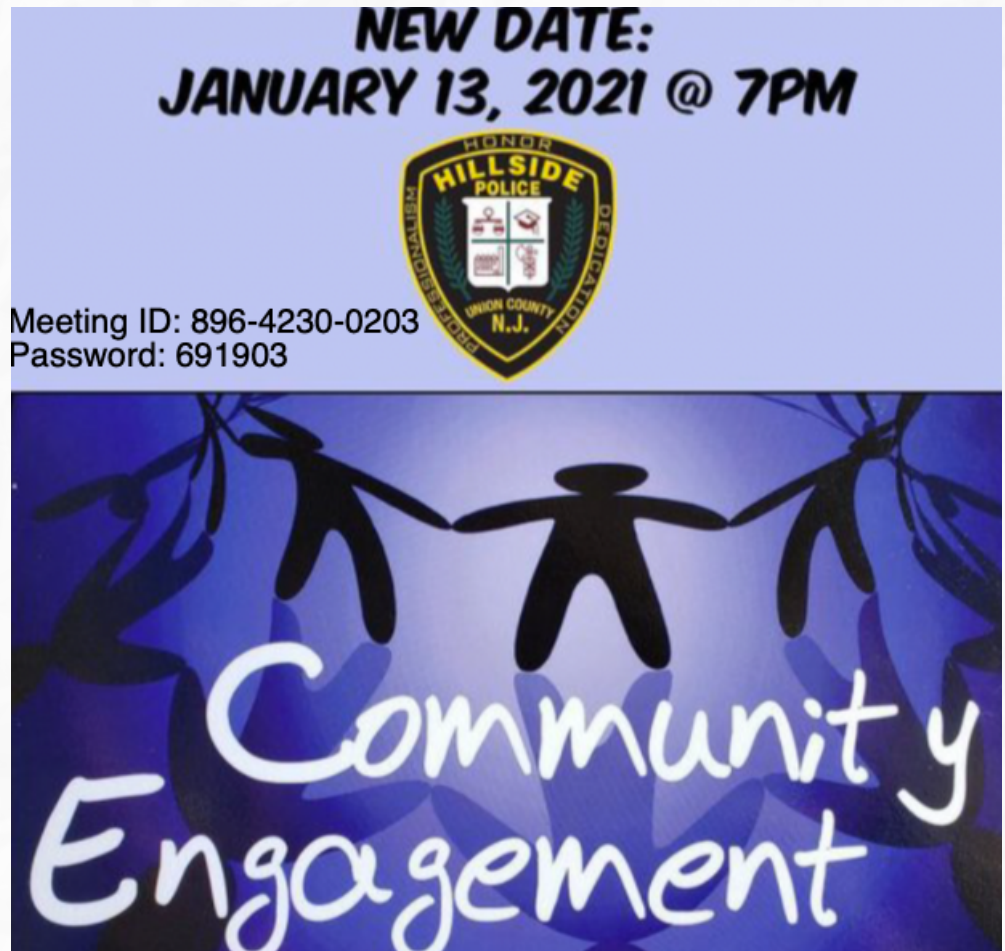
THE TEMPORARY BUDGET SHOULD CAUSE CONCERN

The first Council meeting of the year has already created division among administration and the Council. The Council decided against passing a temporary budget, which will allow Hillside to pay staff and necessary bills for the Township to function until an annual budget could be negotiated. In New Jersey, municipalities normally pass a three-month budget to provide enough time to work out a full budget by the state mandated deadline in March. Unfortunately, for the past two years Hillside’s Council has not followed the proper timeline resulting in the Township being the last community in the state to pass a budget.

MAYOR VERTREESE AND POLICE CHIEF RICCIARDI WILL HOST A COMMUNITY WIDE MEETING THIS WEDNESDAY

Mayor Dahlia Vertreese and Hillside Police Chief Vincent Ricciardi will host a virtual Zoom meeting Wednesday, Jan. 13 beginning at 7 pm. This is an opportunity for residents to hear directly from Chief Ricciardi on the philosophy of the Hillside Police Department. Ricciardi will be joined by members of the police staff who will discuss trending incidents, crime prevention tips and other observations.

There will be time for the residents to ask questions. The event is the first of a monthly series the Mayor will host during 2021 to give Hillside residents an opportunity to hear directly from her leadership team. “It’s critical the community has a chance to not only interact with leaders like Chief Ricciardi, but also get to express their feelings in an environment that allows dialogue,” Mayor Vertreese said.

SNOW REMOVAL/ STREET CLEANING

The Department of Public Works removes snow several days after a snowstorm. For the effective removal of snow, car owners need to adhere to streets that identify the time when roads should be cleared of vehicles. The same applies to street sweeping. Illegally parked cars will be ticketed and potentially towed. Reminder for property owners that Chapter 265 of the Township code requires property owners to remove snow from their sidewalk within 12 hours of a storm.

COVID UPDATE

As of Jan. 6, 2021, the Township had 1,690 confirmed or probable positive COVID cases and 74 reported COVID related deaths. Following a spike in December which could potentially be attributed to the Holiday Season, Health Director Robin Kaufman stresses everyone wash your hands, wear your masks, practice social distancing, and stay away from large gatherings.

VACCINE UPDATE

Union County has not set a date when the general public will be able to get the COVID Vaccination. Currently, the vaccine is limited to essential workers classified as members of Phase 1-A, however, individuals and sworn law enforcement personnel and fire professionals from Phase 1-B can get vaccinations. Health care personnel eligible under the state's guidelines to receive the vaccine must make their appointments through the county's registration webpage. "As more supplies become available, we will announce locations and procedures in accordance with New Jersey Department of Health regulations and guidance," said County Commissioner Chairman Alexander Mirabella. "We hold the health and safety of those we vaccinate in the utmost regard, and we are ensuring that all protocols are in place as we proceed." 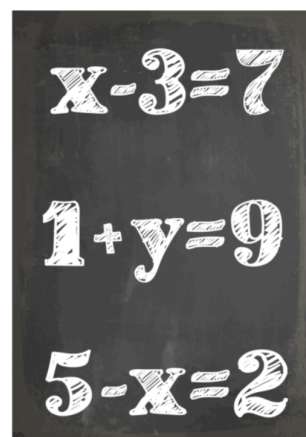

COVID ASSISTANCE

The Senior Center recently received a \$20,000 grant from Rutgers University.
